
A STELLAR CAMP

Supporting the Gift of Life FAS+

At the start of the academic year FastAid, Solihull's life-saving emergency community responder scheme, was unveiled as this year's beneficiary school charity.

A strong bond has developed between our whole school community and the charity whose volunteer CFRs attend over 2,000 local 999 calls and are first on scene to start lifesaving treatment and begin clinical care in 90% of incidents.

Over £11,500 has been raised this year which is a tremendous accomplishment and will help the charity continue to fund two response cars across Solihull, maintain lifesaving equipment and recruit more volunteers.



Charity Challenge

The business world beckoned Form 5 with the launch of the annual Fantastic Fivers Challenge. Each of the 39 pupils was given a £5 note and over the course of the six-week challenge used their own business enterprise and creativity to raise as much money as they could. mannequins the children learned the fundamental steps to take when someone suffers cardiac arrest, leaving them empowered to act confidently in an emergency.



I. Malcolm Edwards (Co-elected Headboy) Attended 1959 - 1964

Malcolm has enjoyed a distinguished career in the publishing industry. In 2012 he moved to McKinney where he started his journey with Impact Activities which has grown to become the largest public tennis and pickleball facilities management company in Texas.

5. Nicholas Seabrook Attended 1987 - 1994

Dr Seabrook is Professor of Political Science and Public Administration at the University of North Florida. He studied American Studies at the University of Nottingham before moving to the University at Buffalo to study an MA and PhD in Political Science.



6. James Thomas (Headboy) Attended 1982 - 1992

Graduating in 2000 from Durham University with a degree in Computer Science, James joined IBM as a management consultant before moving to Deloitte advising clients in the oil and gas industry. In 2007 he joined Booz, Allen, Hamilton's energy practice. The company is known today as Strategy& and Matt leads their Oil and Gas Strategy Consulting practice for the Middle East.
